Who will be teaching?



Antony Billington. Prior to joining LICC as Head of Faculty, Antony taught Hermeneutics and Biblical Theology at London School of Theology (LST) for 16 years. His aim is to help Christians integrate biblical and theological breadth in their walk with the Lord, church life and engagement with the contemporary world.

Mark Greene was formerly Vice-Principal and Lecturer in Communications at LST, having previously spent 10 years in advertising. He is now LICC's Executive Director and a regular speaker at Christian events in the UK and abroad. Publications include *Thank God It's Monday, Imagine How We Can Reach the UK* and *The Best Idea in the World*.



Nigel Hopper is LICC's Lecturer in Contemporary Culture. He holds undergraduate and postgraduate degrees in theology from LST, including studies on contemporary music. Prior to joining LICC, he spent 5 years as an Editor with Scripture Union and before that was minister of a Baptist church in Ipswich.

Margaret Killingray has been a lecturer and tutor at LICC since the late 1980s. She has degrees in Sociology and Theology and is particularly interested in adult learning. She has written LICC's *Word for the Week* since 2001.
