## What is Toolbox?

Toolbox is a highly-acclaimed and innovative Monday to Friday course, designed to envision Christians from all walks of life with the central importance of whole-life discipleship, and to equip them with the practical skills for fruitful engagement with both God's word and God's world. To this end, the course will enable you to:

- Understand the inhibiting impact of the sacred-secular divide on church life and Christian mission and living, and develop a vision for whole-life discipleship.
- Develop a robust method for interpreting the Bible and applying it to contemporary life.
- Develop specific skills in reading contemporary culture through a biblical lens, and apply those skills to contemporary issues and your own life context.

The aim of Toolbox is not only to pass on vital skills, but also to help you explore how you might change the world around you, in whatever daily contexts God has placed you – in an office, in a church, in a home. It's about learning how we live well in, and for Christ, in our rapidly changing culture.

## The Toolbox approach to learning

Toolbox creatively combines interactive lectures, small group discussions, participant presentations and projects, plus time for personal reflection to ensure that you have the opportunity to apply what you're learning to the situations and people you encounter in your everyday life. In addition, Toolbox uses fieldtrips to reinforce learning and inspire imaginative application.



A trip to the Tate Modern, for example, will require you to identify specific examples of worldviews; a guided tour around Christian London will be employed as a springboard for reflection on how, historically, Christians have worked to make a difference to society; a visit to the cinema will help you learn skills in reading media and to engage critically with any contemporary issues raised, whilst a trip to leading London stores will challenge you to look at shopping and consumerism through new eyes.

**Antony Billington.** Prior to joining LICC as Head of Theology, Antony taught Hermeneutics and Biblical Theology at London School of Theology (LST) for 16 years.
